



OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH THE DIVISION OF WATER

The mission of the Kentucky Division of Water (DOW) is to manage, protect and enhance the quality and quantity of the Commonwealth's water resources for present and future generations through voluntary, regulatory and educational programs.

DOW provides assistance on technical needs, curriculum development, public outreach, watershed planning, and educational programs for students of all ages.

- **Stream Table** – A tool that allows students to set up a realistic stream simulation and demonstrate the impacts of stream flow on processes like erosion, deposition, and pollutant dispersal in an aquatic environment. 

COMMUNITY EDUCATION INITIATIVES

School and youth based programs, adult community programs, and shoreline and streamside cleanups are all part of the Water Watch community education initiative.

- ***Elementary Level***
Materials and training are available for conducting school talks, including teaching materials and Ollie Otter, the clean water mascot.
- ***High School Level***
Water testing and science projects suitable for intermediate and advanced chemistry, biology and environmental sciences are available for use in high school settings.
- ***Teachers' In-Service Programs***
Free training and materials in water resource activities are available along with information for teachers, including follow-up and support while units are being taught.
- ***Stream Walks***
School and youth groups can conduct stream walks. Materials are available for loan for groups conducting these activities. The materials include field guides, leader guides, dipnets and water testing kits.

Adult Community Programs


- ***Speakers***
We can help civic organizations schedule speakers on a variety of topics on water resource issues.
- ***Stream Walks or Canoe Floats***
Assistance is available for a group that wants to sponsor a community canoe float or stream walk on a favorite stream. These are excellent opportunities to show people the beauty and value of the waterway.

Shoreline or Streamside Cleanups

April is Keep America Beautiful Month. All water watchers are encouraged to conduct stream or lake cleanups. Assistance can be provided with how-to handbooks and certificates of appreciation for volunteers.

Kentucky Rivers Month

June is Kentucky Rivers Month. Groups are asked to conduct recreational events to focus community attention on the positive benefits of local waterways.
